1915	 Society of San Francisco Women Artists merges with San Francisco Art Association
1925	 Society of San Francisco Women Artists again becomes a separate organization It's goal is "the study and furtherance of all interests common to the arts both graphic and plasticand to support causes neglected by other art organizations in the Bay Area"
1926	 SSFWA holds 1st Exhibition Meetings held at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art on Van Ness
1931	 SSFWA sponsors the first Decorative Native Arts exhibit at the De Young
1932	 First Museum Annual; Annuals continue for 37 years at the Legion of Honor, the de Young, and later at the Museum of Modern Art Frida Kahlo's painting "Frieda and Diego Rivera" is shown at the "Sixth Annual Exhibition of the San Francisco Society of Women Artists" - the first public showing of her work.
1939	SSFWA contributes to the 1939 Golden Gate International Exhibition (murals
